YTC is dedicated to developing and producing works from diverse writers including women, writers of color and writers from the LGBTQ community. Andrew also serves as the Vice-Curator for Newark's Global Shapers Community hub, an international initiative of the World Economic Forum, designed to empower young leaders between 20-30 years old,

to impact and change their communities. Andrew is also the Associate Director of the award winning Special Ensemble and a fellow for Leadership Newark's class of 2018. Perhaps the most important role Andrew has is as a mentor. He's seen firsthand the transformative impact mentoring can have on a young man.
